Dress a Girl Report

The fall shipment of 253 dresses, to the Philippines, that was our Oct., Nov. Dec. total, was shipped mid-Jan., and just arrived at my Rotarian International Contact in Rosario Cavite. True, most do not take this long; however, with all the storms raging in the Pacific, it takes patience. Gabe Santos just e-mailed me yesterday, that the box arrived, and they will be distributing our dresses, along with shoes, to the needy in a different area, further south of him, where they are desperately needed. Pictures will be on his web-site so if you are dressing girls around the world or know someone who did, please pass the word. I will inform you of that site, and when they are posted!

Fifty lb., of dresses are being taken in 2 weeks by missionaries of the Sure Foundation in Puna.

They are going north of Manila, to a mountain area. Then in July, missionaries from Glad Tiding church are taking 75 dresses to the Marshall Islands. I've also been asked by the church we gave to last year for Operation Christmas child's shoebox ministry. So DAG is still growing in Hilo. Please know that many of these seamstresses are using up their FCE labels.

APRIL PLT: AUTISM/MAKE A MEMO BOOK

AUTISM SPECTRUM DISORDER

Dr. Dixie Dumaran spoke to the group about Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD): a developmental disability caused by differences in the brain. Nothing about how people with ASD look set them apart from others but they communicate, interact, behave, and learn in ways that are different from most other people. Children or adults with ASD might: not look at objects when others point to them, relating to others, avoid eye contact; want to be alone, trouble understanding people's feelings, prefer not to be held or cuddled, unaware people talking to them; repeat



or echo words or phrases, repeat actions over and over among a few. If you think your child might have a problem, see your doctor; ask for referral to see developmental pediatrician or specialist. Contact your local early intervention agency for children under 3 or local public school for 3 and older even if your child does not go to school. AUTISM – HEARTH FIRE SERIES #50

Pat Kubo presented a skit based on the NAFCE Hearth Fire book "Woman to Woman ...How do we talk about Autism?" Autism isn't a disease – it's a condition that causes one's body to react to its environment differently than anyone else. Not contagious, no retardation. Some have been diagnosed to be highly intelligent! Pat also gave other information regarding Autism.



MAY PLT: Alzheimer's & Dementia – Guest Speaker, Pam Yuen, Program Coordinator, Alzheimer's Association, Aloha Chapter, spoke to our members on May 27th. Do you know the 10 signs for early detection? Here they are: 1: Memory changes that disrupt daily life; 2: Challenges in planning or solving problems; 3: Difficulty completing familiar tasks; 4: Confusion with time or place; 5: Trouble understanding visual images and spatial relationships; 6: New problems with words in speaking or writing; 7: Misplacing things and losing the ability to retrace steps; 8: Decreased or poor judgment; 9: Withdrawal from work or social activities; and 10: Changes in mood and personality. Diagnosis: earlier the better. It may not be Alzheimer or Dementia at all. Some detected

problems can be treated or reversed. Some can be life threatening if not detected or treated promptly. It's important not to ignore changes or assume it is Alzheimer's. Physicians' tests can identify disorders that may cause memory loss, confused thinking, and trouble focusing attention or other symptoms similar to dementia. Possible disorders include Anemia or certain vitamin deficiencies, excess use of alcohol, medication side effects and certain infections. With early diagnosis you can get maximum benefit from available treatments, explore treatments to provide relief of symptoms, early treatment may help individuals remain independent longer and offers opportunity to participate in clinical trials. With early diagnosis you can have more time to consider and plan for the future, participate in arranging your own care, living arrangements, safety, financial and legal matters, transportation, empowered to make decisions and build the right care team and social network. So plan for the future – seek legal advice and services, identify and complete legal documents, make plans for medical and treatment decisions; make plans for finances and property and name a person to make

decisions on your behalf when you no longer can. REMEMBER, YOU ARE NOT ALONE:

JUNE PLT: Ikebana



Charlotte Muraoka and Pat Kubo led the group in a demonstration and hands on art of Ikebana. Ikebana started in the 6th century in Japan, as part of the Buddhist practice of

offering flowers on the altar. The word "ikebana" – "ike" means lake, " ba" means priest, "na" means possessive form, thus ikebana translates to "priest of the lake". First practiced by the imperial family and nobles as well as samurai warriors, Samurais practiced the tea ceremony and ikebana before entering battle to purify their heart and minds. In the 15th century it spread to common people and by the mid 1800's, women

were educated to be "good wives and mothers" and no longer decreed that ikebana was for only males.


