History of Hawaii FCE's Trimble Foundation ~ by Oarlene Wingate

Did you know that the Cooperative Extension Service (CES) came to Hawaii in 1936 and Alice P. Trimble came that year as a 4-H leader? She eventually became the supervisor of the County Home Demonstration program in Hawaii that helped women from the rural communities make their homes attractive and efficient. Alice, with the assistance of the Director of CES, Y. Baron Goto, helped our state organization become a reality in 1947. By 1949, the Hawaii Home Demonstration Council elected its first State President Edith Izumi from Maui. Alice's mission was to help Hawaii's families help themselves!

Funds were set aside to build a clubhouse, but in 1974, as a memorial to Alice for her outstanding leadership, the Extension Homemakers Council established the Alice P. Trimble Foundation as a scholarship fund. Her legacy, the Extension Homemakers, the largest and strongest organization in the territory of Hawaii, continues to exist as Family and Community Education (FCE) and supports community causes to improve Hawaii's communities. The funds have supported 4-H Leaders Forums, Leadership Training for FCE members and non-members, grants for non-profit agencies serving Hawaii's communities, and scholarships for college. Today the fund is held in the Bank of Hawaii's Community Foundation and as of July 31, 2014 was \$77,061. The Trimble Foundation Chair oversees the funds handled by the trustee and solicits and acknowledges private and public donations, while the Trimble Foundation Distribution Committee oversees the distribution of funds. Each year the applications are reviewed and the interest earned is distributed to the recipients who meet the qualifications. For Individuals: 1) must be Hawaii resident for at least 5 years 2) must enroll in an institute of higher education in Hawaii 3) Must pursue study in Education or Human Services 4) must be in need of financial assistance 5) must include 2 letters of recommendation.

For organizations: 1) must provide for maintenance and betterment of public health and welfare of families and communities 2) must be an established non-profit in the State of Hawaii at least 5 years 3) must provide latest financial statement 4) must include two current letters of support from outside the organization.

The Immediate Past State FCE President, since the late 80's, has directed her efforts to fundraise at convention with the assistance of all available past presidents, adding considerable amounts to the Trimble Foundation account. A Trimble Foundation Chair has been needed to oversee the trustee, ensure public donations as well as member contributions, implement fundraising campaigns and bring concerns to the Executive Committee!

Years ago, our State Treasurer served as chair with all council treasurers for her committee, but this year our President has appointed Amy Bugado from Hilo Council to fill this important position. She has already started to gather information to generate a campaign throughout the state. I hope when the plan is revealed, FCE members across the state will assist in any way they can to support her efforts and promote the plan. All current fundraising efforts at meetings, council activities, public activities, and from dues assessment are appreciated by the many individuals and organizations we have assisted financially to help Hawaii's people since 1974.

The Immediate Past President has her own list of responsibilities: 1) advises the President 2) serves as Historian 3)prepares and publishes the Directory 4) updates the Handbook and ensures each board member has a current Handbook 5) Represents the Executive officers on the TF Distribution Committee 6) Arranges for the Past Presidents Breakfast at Convention. Yes, the Past Presidents group can still assist the organization in whatever capacity it chooses: 1) Raising money for Trimble 2) Helping to mentor new officers 3)sorting and downsizing old organizational files 4) assisting on site at conventions 5) helping membership chair 6) or whatever needs arise. But as a group they have no official responsibility to carry out the Trimble Foundation duties as ex-officios.

I would like to thank the Vice Presidents of the FCE Clubs and the Educational Chairs for submitting the many reports to the State Education Chairs.....you made them work very hard and they enjoyed reading about all the wonderful work the members are doing for their fellow members and community. Congratulations to the 2015 Program Award winners!

<u>Health – Education</u>: Puna Wahine Club of Hilo Council learned about the Blue Zone Project.

<u>Health – Action</u>: Windward Oahu Council submitted seven reports on various health topics which included the new hands only CPR and a speaker from Ohana Rehab Services on Fall Prevention.

<u>Health – Leadership</u>: Hui O Wahine Club of Hilo Council held a two day workshop to restore, refresh and rejuvenate their mind, body and soul.

Youth *Education*: Maui Council's Scholarship program helped five recipients further their education by awarding them each with a \$2000 scholarship.

<u>Youth Action</u>: Windward Oahu Council participated at the Children and Youth Day at the State Capital networking for Na Tutu (Grandparents Raising Grandchildren). They organized a Bounce House and taught children to make yarn flowers.

<u>Youth Leadership</u>: Windward Oahu Council participated in the Foster Garden's Midsummer Night's Gleam. FCE members taught craft projects to Waipahu High School students. Guiding a project from beginning to end and involving other groups in the project.

Environment/Home/Community *Education*: Puna Wahine Club of Hilo Council invited the public to learn about Fire Ants from Heather Forester, Invasive Ant Extension Technician, safe removal and identification of these miniscule ants.

<u>Environment/Home/Community Action</u>: Hui O Wahine Club of Hilo Council submitted 12 reports reflecting their outstanding efforts in supporting and assisting the community. Their contributions reached A Dream Come True, Boys and Girls Club, Hawaii Japanese Center, Operation Christmas Child, Food Basket, Hospice of Hilo, Hawaii Island Adult Care, and Women's Shelter to name a few.

Environment/Home/Community *Leadership*: Windward Oahu Council participated with Urban Garden Center to share information on soil types and taught the public to create mini gardens using recycled containers.

Leadership *Education*: Maui Council held educational session on Fraud Prevention and Reporting Refresher.

<u>Leadership Action</u>: Kauai Council Quarterly Newsletter is a collaboration between 15 FCE members and 1 non-FCE member to publish items of interest to keep members abreast of club and council activities.

<u>Leadership</u>: Hilo Council's Annual Rummage Sale demonstrated leadership through coordination and delegation of duties amongst FCE members for a successful fundraiser.

<u>International Education</u>: Hui O Wahine Club of Hilo Council assisted the Hawaii Japanese Center with putting on educational exhibit that lasted 3-weeks. The FCE members helped with everything from manning the gift shop to registering people for special classes.

<u>International Action</u>: Kauai Council made 1300 yarn leis filled with the Spirit of Aloha for every athlete and volunteer in the Kadena Special Olympics in Okinawa.

One of 2016 Hawaii FCE State Projects:

Youth Education - "Dress For Success" (Hearth Fire Series #55, copyright 2013)

Members, let's implement this Youth Education Activity to empower high schoolers and/or 4-H members to dress and behave appropriately for job or college admission interviews.

A suggestion for "Dress For Success":

- 1. Your Council or Club decides which youth group will be your targeted audience/project collaborator.
- 2. Contact the group/high school activity coordinator (Key Club, etc.) and find out if they might be interested in FCE coordinating a fashion show/several skits/interview situation showcasing "Do" and "Don't" attire and speech/manners.
- *Depending on how broad your Council/Club wants to "cast your net", you might even organize a program on the local Mall's center stage and include several high schools' student government officers!
- 3. ACTION: Depending on the students and adults, you may need to contact local stores for appropriate dress attire or the students may have them in their closets. You may also have to write out the scripts for whatever program you decide to showcase. Don't be discouraged if all don't show up at your practice/meeting sessions.
- **If you are good at texting, that's the way to reach teens or you can go through their adult contact.
- 4. IF you are overwhelmed just reading this suggestion, please contact me. I am so excited that our youth will have this opportunity to pair with our wonderful FCE members. You will find the high schoolers will step up and you can remind them that this leadership role they are taking on can be another item on their resume.



SERVICE PROJECT: FAMILY PROMISE

2015 Service Project was Family Promise in Kailua at 69 North Kainalu Drive 96734, phone 261-7478. In 2014 there were 98 people in the Evening program and 115 people in the Day program. The financial donations enable them to house more families. They keep their day center open year round with qualified, caring staff. Volunteers provide nightly shelter and meals and much needed moral support and resources. Local foundations have provided washing machines, dryers, computer equipment and a 15passenger van for the two day center. Yes, it takes a village to make these families lives a little easier as they transition into housing.

Donations were collected from members at all 19 Windward Oahu meetings - Board, Council and PLT's. Types of items included clothes, toiletries, school supplies, paper goods, and food (which is not needed). Goods donated were \$830.39 and cash of \$200.00 for total \$1030.39 as of November 23, 2015. Mahalo to Evelyn Cabral and Maggie Schulte for transporting items to Family Promise.
