- Eat with Friends and Family: Stress hormones can interfere with your digestion and degrade food metabolism
  - > Never eat standing up
  - > Never eat while driving
  - When you eat alone, just eat. Avoid reading, watching TV, or perusing your phone or computer all of which lead to faster, mindless eating.
  - > Establish a time and a family rule that everyone eats dinner together
- Celebrate and Enjoy Food: Don't deprive yourself.
  - Pick one day of the week and make it your celebratory day to splurge on a meal with your favorite foods.
  - > Feel free to indulge at family celebrations and holidays.
- Four Always and Four to Avoid:

Four Always	Four to Avoid
100 percent whole wheat bread	Sugar-sweetened beverages
Nuts	Salty snacks
Beans	Processed meats
Fruits	Packaged sweets

- ✤ Kitchen Checklist:
  - > Post a sign with the Four Always & Four to Avoid on refrigerator
  - > Dedicate the center section of your refrigerator to fruits and veggies
  - > Use dinner plates no larger than ten inches
  - > Drink out of tall, narrow glasses no more than 2.5 inches in diameter.
  - Create an out-of-the-way junk food location
  - Pre-plate your food
  - Remove TV, cell phones, and computer from your kitchen and dining room. (promotes mindless eating)
  - > Put a full fresh fruit bowl in the most prominent place in your kitchen.
  - Use hand-operated kitchen tools. (manual can opener, potato masher, garlic press, whisk rather than electric mixer, squeeze fruit by hand) Encourage hand and arm strengthening.

# International Education Chair – Denise Smith

Mahalo to Kauai Council for integrating their Christmas celebration with an International event when Gladys Fujiuchi shared her recent adventures traveling in the South Asian county of Bhutan. Gladys and fellow FCE members also provided some Bhutan food dishes for everyone to try.

ACWW has approved its 1,000 project for funding since the Projects Committee was set up in 1977. The 1,000<sup>th</sup> project is "Computer Literacy for Adults and Children" in Kolkata, West Bengal, India. A group of 15 young women and 5 children were selected from underprivileged local students. They were selected for having an aptitude for and interest in computer literacy. Five computers, a printer and scanner and other accessories will be purchased for them. The students will be trained in Microsoft Word, Desk Top Publishing, Tally, and Financial Accounts, as well as other programs. The younger children will be taught more basic training courses. The courses will last one year, after which there will be an assessment by an external examiner. They will be assisted in finding job placements with local educational and professional institutions. It is hoped that the project will raise awareness of the importance of computer education, and give the students the means to improve their status and their prospects in the employment market.\*
