#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Two major changes are in store for us as members of HAFCE. First, there is a vacancy on the HAFCE Executive Committee – Vice President. The other one is for the position of Educational Chairperson – Leadership. Both of these positions had very active persons who loved HAFCE and what our organization does with its members as well as in the community. Sad to say that these two individuals, Elaine "Queenie" Daligdig (Vice President) and Oarlene Wingate (Leadership) have had to relinquish their positions due to family situations and health issues. Thank you ladies, for giving your time and energies to support and promote FCE. We look forward in the future when your situations change for the better and your return to HAFCE and continue to serve with us.

So, what happens now? Well, that's a great question. I will address the most pressing position. ## 71st Hawai'i FCE Convention

Author, artist, and educator, Leilehua Yuen has been dedicated to the study and perpetuation of Hawaiian culture since childhood. Raised in Hilo and Puna by her grandparents, Henry and Thelma Yuen, Leilehua learned many of the old ways from them. Her Tutu Kane Henry was a Western-trained MD, and may have been the first Native Hawaiian MD to practice on the Big Island. He also was extremely knowledgeable in the herb lore of old Hawai`i. He was a native speaker of the Hawaiian language and had been born and reared on Kaua`i. Leilehua learned from him about plants, philosophy, and the health of the kino (body). Tutu Wahine Thelma was a homemaker and fine amateur artist, and taught Leilehua lei making, hula, storytelling, and other arts. Both of Leilehua's parents are professional artists, and also trained her as she grew older. Leilehua studied formally in Journalism and Fine Arts, and holds a Certificate in Education for Ministry, earned in 1986, from the University of the South School of Theology at Sewanee, Tennessee. She continued her studies of Hawai`i- ana with respected island kupuna (elders) such as Nona Beamer, who mentored Leilehua for over a decade.

Invited to events around the world, she chanted before delegates of the United Nations during a conference in Los Angeles, and has performed and taught hula on the Mainland US, Canada, Europe, Japan, and in China. While in China, she performed at a banquet the Mayor of Sanya gave for a diplomatic trade mission, which included dignitaries from Hawai`i, Washington DC, Hainan, and Beijing. She also was asked to craft a traditional ancient style of lei for presentation to the Mayor, and chant an oli she composed in honor of the City of Sanya and the Island of Hainan. In 2006 Leilehua and her husband, Manu Josiah, introduced Hula Ki`i to Japan as guests of Yamazaki Sensei and her hālau. Currently, in addition to working with her husband in their businesses, she also teaches Hawaiian culture and arts, and has given seminars, lectures, workshops, and classes for Queen Lili`uokalani Children's Center, Kamehameha Traveling Preschool, The Bishop Museum Amy B.H. Greenwell Ethnobotanical Garden, the University of Hawai`i, the US National Parks Service, and many private groups. She also writes about various aspects of Hawaiian culture, and continues to create her art. Leilehua will be our guide on the sightseeing tour of Downtown Hilo on **Saturday, October19th, 11:30 am** at convention.

#### FOSTER GARDENS - GLEEM



Members from our two clubs -Hui O'Makani and Imiola, attended our annual service community project with Foster Gardens located in Honolulu, Hawaii. With the event being held from 4:00 pm to 6:30 pm, families came together to spend the early evening event. There were lots of activities for the family to participate – from crafts, visiting of the



gardens, games for all ages and refreshments for the enjoyment of attendees. Our member's station was recycling water bottles into planters. By cutting the bottles in half, turning the spout portion upside down into the bottom portion of the bottle, inserting a coffee filter, placing some soil and then planting a hardy vine for attendees to take home. The work was fast and furious with so many children wanting to try the activity. A surprising twist to the activity

- parents were so amazed at the simplicity of the activity, they too wanted to make the planter. There were over 6,000 in attendance and not a moment of rest for our loyal members of Windward Oahu FCE.

**COMPOSITING @ URBAN GARDEN CENTER**

With rainy weather at the Urban Garden Center, members still gathered to learn about composting techniques. Master Gardener, Phyllis Fong, very knowledgeable about composting, was assisted by Curtis Massie. We learned how garden materials are layered (leaves, newspaper, food/fruit waste, coffee grounds) and needed in order to have proper balance of materials (carbon and nitrogen = one part carbon to two/three parts nitrogen). The thermometer in the compost pile measures the temperature of the compost pile. Worms are used and are very beneficial to having an excellent soil. Phyllis also emphasized that bins that do not have holes in them are not good containers to do your composting in such as those that you spin with a handle. She recommends simple bins that can be ordered online which allows air circulation. If you have a Starbucks near you, you might ask them if you could have their discarded coffee grinds. Remember to cut your materials into smaller pieces to speed up the process. Bea Sailer gave members a tour of the facility where they propagate plants for their monthly second Saturday sales which the general public is not allowed to view. Aubin Stemler gave members a tour of a portion of the garden that he maintains as a volunteer. The volunteers at Urban Garden Center are very well informed and answered all of the member's questions. An enjoyable lunch of bentos, plus extras which Pat Kubo bought to supplement the bentos. Those attending were Nancy Arakaki, Evelyn Cabral, Emily Deai, Dixie Dumaran, David and Ruthie Haitsuka, Jordan Lane, Chutima Leider and June Tom. We had five guests in attendance.

#### WINDWARD OAHU SERVICE PROJECT

Service Project for Windward Oahu is Beacon of Hope located in Kailua, is a transitional house for women who have been in prison. Daphine Hookano, a former addict who once was convicted of selling drugs, met Rev. Sam Cox, a retired Methodist minister, shared the same vision of transforming the lives of women when they leave prison. Rev. Cox was going to sell his home after the death of his wife, who was a social worker at the women's prison. Instead of selling, he decided to lease his home for \$1 to the United Methodist Church after WCCC Warden Mark Patterson mentioned about the critical need for transition homes.





Hookano was recommended as the program facilitator. Graduates, known as "Beaconites, will be encouraged doing a mentorship program to keep other women from returning to the old habits and lifestyles that made them go to prison. Windward Members donated clothing, linen, household items, etc. for these women who leave prison with the shirts on their backs. #### **ANNIE/SHIRLEY'S FROZEN CRANBERRY DESSERT**

#### **Ingredients:**

6 oz. cream cheese 2 T. mayo 2 T sugar 16 oz. can whole cranberry sauce 8 oz. can crushed pineapple, drained  $\frac{1}{2}$  c. walnuts

#### **ALMOND ICE**

#### **Ingredients:**

5 envelopes unflavored gelatin - dissolve in 1 cup cold water 2<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cups boiling water 1 1/3 cups sugar 1 1/3 cups cold water 1 Tbsp. + 1 tsp almond extract 1 cup strawberries, halved

1 c. Cool Whip (If using whipping cream, add 1 tsp. vanilla &  $\frac{1}{2}$  c. powdered sugar)

#### **Directions:**

Soften cream cheese. Add mayo and sugar. Add pineapple, nuts and cranberry sauce. Fold Cool Whip into cheese mixture. Pour into pan and freeze for 6 hours.
