Aloha Oe A fond farewell to Gladys "Cookie" Brown



During the recent stay-at-home orders, the **smart shopping-buy what you need** is a good strategy you may want to try. This entails making a food shopping list based on meals you plan to prepare. The idea of making a shopping list with meals in mind is to check your refrigerator and pantry to see what you already have on hand ("shopping your kitchen first") and



then to consider how many meals you'll likely to eat at home before your next shopping trip and buy accordingly. Once a week, I like to look in my fridge and cupboards to see what perishables and other items I should use before they go bad, come up with meals to make, and make a shopping list of items needed to prepare the meals. By doing this, I will use what I already have, waste less, and save time and money! By buying no more than what I expect to use, I am more likely to use it up and keep it fresh.! During the COVID-19 pandemic, I've been keeping busy on the weekends sewing cloth masks for family, friends, coworkers, and donating them to people in the community. Rich and I have sewed over 100 cloth masks. My husband Rich cuts the fabric and wire, and I sew them together!

Day 1 – Chicken Katsu or Pork Katsu Day 2 – Left Over Katsu -- **Oyako Danburi**

Left over Katsu 1 Tbsp sake

1 ½ cup chicken stockBamboo shoots, sliced4 Tbsp shoyuMushrooms, slivered

2 ½ Tbsp sugar 5 – 6 eggs

Cook vegetables until almost done
 Beat eggs and pour over Katsu

2. Add leftover Katsu 5. Serve Katsu and vegetables over hot rice

3. Add stock, shoyu, sugar, sake

Our Statewide Project - By Jacquie Maly

Do you recall what the project is? If not, it is not surprising with all that has happened since the Hawaii FCE Convention last fall. It seems like that was years in the past, rather than months. So, let me jog your memory. At our last convention we decided on a goal of <u>Eliminating Food Waste</u>. If you attended the last convention, you may recall completing a short questionnaire on the topic.

Statewide Project Continued

Look over these following tips, think about them, and adopt any that might work for you. Certainly, food waste is a major problem worldwide. Right now, with the pandemic, you have all seen those long lines of cars, not only on the mainland, but here in Hawaii as well, people in desperate need of food. With so many folks in need, this is no time to be wasting food. Additionally, we all know firsthand that the cost of food here in Hawaii is among the highest in the nation. Just another reason not to let it go to waste. So, I encourage you to take the first step, read the tips, and think about the problem and some possible solutions. In future issues of <u>The Homemaker Echo</u>, I will be sharing more on this topic with you. In the meantime, consider how you can share this information with others in your community. Let's see if we can get this project to "spread like a virus."

Tip # 1 - Make a List

Each week, plan out what you'll make for your meals, create a shopping list, and stick to it. Going into the store with a game plan will prevent you from buying too much food. Even better, you won't have to stare blankly into your fridge every night and decide what to make.

Tip #2 - Plan Ahead

Think about the week ahead, and what events and obligations you have. If you have plans Tuesday and Thursday, plan accordingly.

<u>Tip #3 - Multi-Purpose Ingredients</u>

Plan your meals around how ingredients in meals can work together. If you want to make something with blue cheese one night, make sure another recipe that week also calls for it, so you don't end up with half a container of it on your hands when Friday rolls around.

Hoaloha FCE Club Community Service Project - Child and Welfare Services – By Lee Watanabe

Throughout the year, Hoaloha Club purchases and collects items for their service project to the Child Welfare Services (CWS). These items will be distributed to the less fortunate children that their families would otherwise not be able to supply. This presentation was done at CWS's staff training meeting. It made it more meaningful as many of the social workers were present. The workers were very excited, so excited that they were choosing specific items for "their children". It's a very personal



feeling that they each have for the families they assist. The excitement and gratitude they expressed were very rewarding and worthwhile. This is a project which Hoaloha will do again.
