CHARACTER COUNTS! Essay and Artwork Contest "CITIZENSHIP"

This contest is held annually statewide and on a national level to promote ethics among children using the "Six Pillars of Character" (responsibility, fairness, caring, citizenship, trustworthiness, and respect) from the Josephson Institute. It also encourages students to improve their writing and drawing skills, creates public awareness in the achievements of students and offers an opportunity for local FCE members to participate in a nationwide project. Any current 4th grade student attending a public, private or home school is eligible to participate in the contest which begins September 1st and runs through March 1st. Founded in memory of Alice P. Trimble, Hawaii's first State Leader, Cooperative Extension Service

The Maui Association for Family & Community Education offered five \$2,000 scholarships to qualifying high school seniors from the island of Maui. Of the 41 applicants from seven schools on the island of Maui, the judges selected five recipients. The criteria: resident of Maui for last 5 years, maintained a 3.0 cumulative grade point average on a 4.0 scale, demonstrated financial need, and exhibited good character in community and school.



LEADERSHIP

"Teaching Techniques" helped members to explore different methods of group processing and to understand that teamwork can be more effective in the group process if the participants can come to an understanding.

Hilo Council hosted a candidates forum for the public with 26 county and state candidates. The members have been providing this forum for the last 20 years.

HEALTH

Every council sponsored programs for the public on eating healthy foods as well as learning about foods from other cultures. Hilo FCE members collaborated with Hawaii County services to present a workshop on Elder Abuse to enhance awareness of it, to learn how to prevent it, and how to help expedite the prosecution of elder abuse and exploitation cases.

YOUTH EDUCATION

Projects for children of all ages allowed South Oahu members to teach the value of conserving our resources.

Every Council participates in the CHARACTER COUNTS! Essay and Art Contest sponsored annually for 4th graders throughout the state.

INTERNATIONAL PROJECTS

Hilo, South Oahu, Maui Members learned about foods. music and customs of Korea, Indonesia, Poland, Italy and Mexico. A Hilo club raised \$500 to assist in restoring a park pavilion for residents in Japan after the 2011 Tsunami. One of the club members was able to visit the location and help with clean-up and restoration. the Hilo has been sewing dresses for little girls for the "Dress A Girl Around the World project; Deliveries have been made to Thailand and Philippines.

ENVIRONMENTAL AWARENESS



Kona, Hamakua and Hilo

Members of the Big Island FCE councils gathered to spend a day at the Natural Energy Lab of Hawaii Authority (NELHA) to learn about the resources that are unique to NELHA. They were able to tour a deep seawater abalone farm, as well as the Spirulina and Astaxanthin farms and see how using seawater and natural sunshine helps in developing and supporting sustainable businesses in Hawaii. Each year the Hilo FCE members participate in the "Get the Drift and Bag It" campaign by picking up litter at the Wailoa boat harbor. They also sponsor a rummage sale recycling back to the community with proceeds donated to Hawaii FCE's Trimble Foundation.

Maui

Maui FCE members learned how to make a planter from used plastic water bottles. Starter lettuce plants were provided as well as potting soil and participants were encouraged to begin their own gardens using these recycled products. Members also shared knowledge of making a terrarium for the home or office.





Kauai

Kauai FCE council has embraced "RRR: - Reduce, Reuse and Recycle, where each member has created an RRR kit containing a plate, napkin, drinking vessel and utensils which is brought to any event that food is served. This cuts down on the use of paper products. They have shown their artistic talent by entering recycled art work at the Kauai County Fair. Cheyenne St. John, youngest member in Kauai Council, won Best of Show for her colorful rainbow art made from bottle caps.

Oahu

The Oahu members maintain an active partnership with the Urban Garden Centers by helping to present programs on gardening and water conservation, cooking from the garden, and 4-H food shows. They have also been a resource for the annual Recycle Hawaii Resource Day for Teachers held in September. FCE members demonstrated various craft and garden items made from recycled items. Other projects have been learning to make affordable gifts, photo albums and even a necklace bag from scrap items such as toilet paper rolls, greeting cards and yarn scraps—truly "Trash to Treasures." Educational programs presented to school children help teach about Hawaii"s Recycling Program and how it affects our lives.
