Ad Hoc Committee for Preservation of HAFCE Historical Materials – Submitted by Denise Smith

The purpose of this ad hoc committee is to dispose of excess HAFCE assets and to find a means of preserving HAFCE scrapbooks, annual reports, newsletters, & photographs. Once these items are preserved, then we must find a secure location for these materials so that they are available for researchers and historians interested in HAFCE contributions to our families and communities. Current members of the committee are Martha Yamada, Frances Dinnan, Denise Smith, and honorary member Katsuko Enoki.

As of September 2022, all Memories and History of Hawaii's Homemakers books, "How to Make It "- Your Hawaiian Quilt books, and Lanai FCE Council historical materials have been given to statewide museums and/or cultural centers. Still remaining are 34 enamel membership pins. HAFCE scrapbooks, our Ke Lei Hano Heritage award, & wood Expansion award bowl are in a locked, climate-controlled storage in Extra Space Storage, Hilo. There was recently an accidental fire at the facility but our materials remain secure and were not damaged. The monthly storage fee is being paid for by HAFCE funds.

The committee has also recently made contact with Kepā Maly who is a cultural ethnographer – resource specialist and held an in person/Zoom meeting with him. He has made suggestions as to how we can possibly obtain funds and locate resources for digitizing our materials. As a result of meeting with him, the committee is now soliciting all clubs & councils to submit statistical data on the historical materials they have in their possession, so that we can have exact data to submit for digitizing cost estimates. Once the materials have been digitized, we will search for a location that will keep all this material in perpetuity.

We would like to include a quote from Mr. Maly after he reviewed our materials:

"The collection presents a rare/unique view into the lives of women across the islands during the planation era; and for most, provides insights in their efforts in adapting to a new home, and assuming roles of leadership in their communities. History in the islands is largely dominated by the activities of men, and here we have the opportunity to learn about women, families and community well-being."

GROWING HERBS by Jacquie Maly

Since our planned trip to Bishop Museum was cancelled, Jacquie Maly used this opportunity to present a program about Herbs. Jacquie has a garden whereby she grows various herbs. Some of the herbs that she has in her garden are sage, oregano, curry, regular and Italian parsley, chives (garlic), rosemary and thyme. Jacquie indicated that there are two types of chives. Garlic and Onion. Other herbs grown were coca cola, spearmint, strawberry mint, peppermint, chocolate mint, and other mints which she needed to be potted. She also grows lavender and flowers for fun and also a cotton plant. Cotton plants were grown on Haiku Road in Kaneohe. Jacquie showed us the cotton and were able to look at the seeds that were embedded in the cotton. Her planting tables were built for her by members of her Kiwanis club. These planting tables are approximately three feet off the ground so that Jacquie does not need to bend to garden. Jacquie indicated that she does not have an electric bill but water she does. In order to save on her water bill, she collects rain water to water her plants. As an experiment, she made dill crescent rolls for members. The crescent roll were just out of the oven and were very delicious. When using dill, the ratio for dry versus fresh dill is 1 tsp equals to 4 tsp fresh.

Jacquie also provided members with a handout "Recipe for Friendship" which included fun Ideas with Herbs.

Recipe for Friendship:

Take: 1 well-rounded tablespoon of understanding, 1 heaping teaspoon of support 3 good measures of honesty 1 overflowing cup of sharing

Combine all ingredients over a period of time, being sure to add a generous sprinkling of laughter. Serve generous portions and savor well.

Some of her recipes included: Pesto, Basil Oil, Herb Flavored Tea, Let's Try Them All – Party Sandwiches, Rosemary Potatoes, Very Easy Vichyssoise. She also provided some ideas to Experiment: Herb Dinner Rolls, Canned Soup for Guests, Omelets, Pesto Pasta, Salads, Herbal Vinegar, Herbal Honey, Herb Butter, Herb Mayonnaise, Herb Croutons, Herbed Noodles and Herbal Ice Cubes.
