Only #2s – remove caps and labels. What are #2 plastics? Look for the tiny triangle on the bottom of the container. Check your milk jugs, cleaning agents, laundry detergent, bleach, washing and shower oats, cooking oil bottles, toys, and plastic tags.

2023 June Echo - The Plastic Challenge

In the last ECHO, I presented a challenge for the month of May to increase your awareness of how plastics, especially single-use plastics, enter your life and to share your tips in this newsletter so we can all learn together to leave our planet a better place than when we came. I was surprised with how much comes into my life from food packaging! I have started a recycle bin for my #2 plastics (remove cap and labels) since that is the only one that is accepted for recycling on Hawaii Island. I decreased accepting single use plastic utensils and straws but behavior change is not easy.

Here are some good tips I learned from some of our members:

- On Oahu, #1 plastics are picked up for recycling every other Friday.
- They bring their own utensils and metal straws to work.
- Changed storage containers to glass and looks for alternative products sold in glass instead of plastics.
- Switched to glass drinking cups since children are older.
- Switched to reusable silicon containers instead of zip locks.
- Purchased silicon straws on Amazon which are reusable, BPA free, flexible compared to the metal straws.
- Purchase food items in bulk at Island Natural or Abundant Life, such as, oatmeal, dried raisin, spices (saves money and decrease waste)
- Growing own herbs green onions, mint, oregano

- Google: Farm to car. This is an online farmer's market by Ho'ola Farms which supports local farmers. Order from 10 am Friday until 6 pm Monday each week. Choose what you want to order then pick up is that Puna Hongwanji on Wednesdays from 3 6 pm. Saves on packaging
- Takes own containers for leftovers at restaurants to eliminate need for those clam shell plastic containers that are not recyclable. Brilliant idea! She said she gets funny looks sometimes but this is how positive change happens!
- Google: YouTube Zero waste recycle less not more How Bea Johnson's family only produce 1 jar of waste per year. Crazy amazing!

Kepa Maly, Cultural Historian

Pictured here with his wife, Onaona Pomroy-Maly, Kepa has graciously shared his expertise and time with us to take steps to preserve our history. They have worked together researching and documenting Hawaiian traditions and history for more than 45 years. They have developed and published more than 350 studies pertaining to traditional Cultural Properties and Landscapes; Hawaii's communities, and cultural practices on all the Hawaiian Islands, from Hawaii to Niihau and the Northwestern Hawaiian Islands. Independent publications of their own business, Kumu Pono Associates LLC (1991 to the present) have been in the form of:



- Archival and Historical Documentary Studies;
- Oral History Studies;
- Cultural Assessment Studies;
- Communities in Planning Cultural Resource Management Program for Landscapes and Archival Collections; and
- Development of Preservation Plans, Integrated Resource Management Plans, and Interpretive-Educational Programs

Kepa and Onaona believe that the history and role of women in our island community is underrepresented, and that the UE/HAFCE collection represents an important view into the legacy of Hawaii. The presentation will cover thoughts on developing high resolution digital copies of the various club collections, as a way of making the history accessible to families and others interested in the activities women have led for decades. He will also discuss thoughts on finding a permanent archival repository for the original records and developing a website that will help people access this important collection. He holds a special place in our hearts because he is also the son of our State President, Dr. Jacqueline Maly. Sandra Keonaonaokamaileopanaewa Makuakāne Claveria, fondly known as "Aunti Sandi" grew up in Keaukaha (Hawaiian Homes Land) on the island of Hawai'i. She is the youngest of six children of a Native Hawaiian mother, Harriet Makuakāne, and an immigrant, Filipino father Macario Claveria. She is the mother of two awesome children, Keonali and Marcus-Alan and proud tūtū or grandmother of 5 beautiful grandchildren.

Aunti Sandi is a graduate of Hilo High School, and attended Clinton Job

Corps in Clinton, Iowa. She earned her Master's degree in Education, her Bachelor of Arts degree in Sociology and a Minor in Speech Communication from the University of Hawai'i at Hilo.

As an educator, she started her teaching career at the Hilo Community School for Adults and at Hilo High School. She was also an Educational Specialist for the UH-Hilo's Nā Pua No'eau Native Hawaiian Gifted and Talented Children's Program. Aunti Sandi served as the Assistant Professor and Program Coordinator for Hawai'i Community College's Human Services Program where she was one of the first students to receive a Human Services Certificate over 20+ years ago.

As the humble recipient of both the 2006 Hawai'i Community College Outstanding Lecturer Award and the 2010 University of Hawai'i Regents' Medal for Excellence in Teaching Award. She has also received the Francis Davis Award, Service to the Community Award and was the Keynote Speaker at one of the biggest graduation celebrations for Hawaii Community College. Aunti Sandi has been recognized by her peers and students for her exemplary teaching in and outside of the classroom.

Active in community affairs, Aunti Sandi is a member of New Hope Hale Pule Ke Ola Hou Fellowship and served on the Prison and Praise and Worship ministries. Additionally, she served on the Board of the Hilo YWCA, she was instrumental in creating Mālama Kapili Pa'a, a cancer support group in Hilo, and has been a state trainer for Family Community Leadership with the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa.

Aunti Sandi has inspired a variety of groups as a presenter, trainer and keynote speaker. She has also brought laughter to many with her involvement with a group of women called the "Guava Sistahs." Aunty Sandi has also shared her stories about growing up Filipino with a group called "Flip Out."

As a mentor and coach, she believes that it is an honor to be able to inform, ignite, and inspire students to believe, behave and become the very best in them. She is a student of life who lives the true spirit of Aloha. At the age of 74, she decided she would step down and retire from Hawaii Community College. She continues to be involved with community matters in and around her community.

Nutrition Workshop

The nutrition workshop "Nurturing Your Brain" was held on Saturday, April 29, 2023, 10am at Kamana Center room RR. Fourteen members and three guest attended the session. The focus of the session was on how to keep our brains healthy with a Blue Zones presentation by Megan Yarberry and a cooking demo by Kerinne Smith. Megan shared information on how we need a balance of carbohydrates, fats, and proteins and the good and bad types of each. The chickpea, a legume which is rich in iron, potassium (micronutrients), and fiber which we all need to help our digestive system, was the feature of our cooking demonstration. Kerinne demonstrated how to make falafel, a vegetarian Middle Eastern street food, often served with tzatziki, a cucumber yogurt sauce, a good

source of probiotics. She also shared other recipes that used chickpeas and we were treated to samples of roasted chickpeas, blondies, and the falafels. It was so nice to be back in person and we are grateful to Megan and Kerinne for sharing with us their knowledge to help enrich our brains and our soul.

Chickpea Falafel Patties (Blue Zones Project)

Ingredients: 2 cups dried chickpeas (or four 15-oz cans, drained) 5 garlic cloves ¹/₂ sweet onion, sliced 1 c cilantro 1 c parsley 3 tsp ground cumin 2 tsp ground coriander

1 tsp salt
½ tsp black pepper
1/8 tsp ground cardamom
1 T baking powder
Extra-virgin olive oil, as needed (or avocado oil)
Lemon wedges, for serving

Hilo FCE Continued

Directions:

- 1. If using dried chickpeas, place them in a large bowl. Cover with at least 6 cups of water. Allow to soak for 18-24 hours. Drain well, if using canned, skip this step.
- 2. Place the chickpeas and the remaining falafel ingredients (except olive oil and lemon) into a food processor. Grind until the mixture begins to hold together, scraping sides occasionally.
- 3. Take a handful of the mixture and form a ball. If the mixture holds together, it's ready to be formed. If it doesn't hold together, grind it further. Don't add water, as this will make the dough too wet and it won't hold together.
- 4. Form the falafel into ¹/₄-inch-thick patties.
- 5. Heat a medium skillet over high heat. When the skillet is hot, add enough oil to generously coat the pan and create a thin layer.
- 6. When the oil is hot, gently add the falafel patties to the skillet. Cook for 4 minutes, 2 minutes on each side or until browned. Remove to a paper towel-lined plate to cool.
- 7. Serve in a sandwich or on top of a sturdy salad with a squeeze of lemon.

While everyone may know *The Colonel*, Mr. Ed may be one of Hawaii's best-kept secrets - our own uncrowned King of Jams and Baker Extraordinaire! shared with us his secrets and his precious recipes that he has used for the last 32 years that he and his family have been in business. Mr. Ed and his assistants let us loose in his huge kitchen and we experimented...OMGoodness, so many flavors, so little time! We selected lilikoi calamondin, guava, mango, poha berry and ube (haupia sweet potato), and went straight to work. We learned how to prepare, process, cook and can the fruit. Yup, we were jammin'! 

FRESH FLOWER ARRANGEMENT by Patricia Kubo



If you ever wanted to get fresh flowers and design a flower arrangement, Patricia Kubo's hands on demonstration was excellent. After describing the techniques of flower arrangement, she handed out to each member their flower kits (bunch of flowers, container for which the flowers were to be placed, extra enrichment pieces for accents, etc.). Pat explained



that the container for which you want your flowers in shouldn't be twice the size of the flower arrangement (centerpiece). Flowers do not need to be arranged straight up and down. The arrangement should not have too many leaves, especially when placing the stem into the base of the arrangement. When cutting, cut your stems at an angle so that you have a point when inserting into the floral base and cut under water so that the water will stay up in the stems of the flowers. When creating a centerpiece for the table, you want it to look great from all angles of the table. (If against a wall, then that's fine.) EXCUSION TO BISHOP MUSEUM – PARLEY AIR STATION HAWAII









Jacquie Maly, who is a docent at the Bishop Museum, arranged for our members to visit the Parley Air Station Hawaii at the Bishop Museum. A young gentleman by the name of Joshua Gonzalez of Kaneohe was the presenter for the Parley Air Station Hawaii. This organization works with non-profit groups. Joshua emphasized the oceans cover the majority of the earth's surface, especially where we live in Hawaii. Every second breath that we take is generated by the ocean. When we think about oxygen and how we get oxygen, we think about photosynthesis, trees and forests. We have microbes and

all sorts algae that photosynthesizes over 70% of the air we breathe. In Hawaii, it's 80% or more. Without the oceans being healthy, it's the major source of the air we breathe that is being affected and contaminated. We need to keep the oceans healthy. No oceans, no water, no air. For more information, you can Goggle Parley Air Station Hawaii. As a side note, at the annual convention, Hilo Council is currently working with this organization to do a presentation on this topic as it connects with one of our HAFCE State Projects.
