

Hawaii Association for Family and Community Education has consistently highlighted Hawaii's talented 4th grade students by working with and encouraging public, private and home school 4th

grade students to participate in this national essay and artwork contest. Many long-time members of HAFCE understand the value of the National FCE Essay and Artwork Contest, however, HAFCE has gain quite a few new



members. So, here's some information about the National FCE Essay and Artwork Contest. The National FCE Essay and Artwork Contest is based each year on a character value based on CHARACTER COUNTS! @, which is an organization whose purpose is to build students' character, social-emotional, and academic skills, while shaping a positive school culture. One of its key programs is The Six Pillars or Character: Trustworthiness, Respect, Responsibility, Fairness, Caring, and Citizenship. This national contest is presented each year by National FCE and is open to all 4^{th} grade students in public, private, and home schools. The purpose of the contest is to promote literacy and community involvement. The 2024 - 2025 contest is to encourage students

to understand and practice TRUSTWORINESS. The contest encourages students to strive for excellence and creativity in reading, writing, and drawing skills.

In the 2023 national contest, Kauai's Shaylen Satta won 1^{st} place in the National FCE Contest. She and her family where able to attend the Friday night banquet at the HAFCE 75^{th} Annual Business Meeting and Convention where she presented her artwork and read her essay. Kauai's entry by Kaira Terui won 1^{st} place in the 2024 National FCE Contest, and we hope to see her at the 2024 Annual Business meeting on Kauai on October 19^{th} .

Ad Hoc Committee for Preservation of HAFCE Historical

The continuing members of the committee are Frances Dinnan, Denise Smith, and honorary member Katsuko Enoki. The committee continues to work with Kepā Maly, cultural ethnographer and resource specialist. He and his wife Onaona have been a valuable resource for us in this long journey of preserving our important FCE history.

We are pleased to announce that we feel there has been success in convincing the University of Hawaii to accept our historical materials! We received a surprise email from Dore Minatodani, Senior Librarian, Hawaiian Collection, University of Hawaii Manoa, inviting us to join her in a Zoom meeting to discuss our FCE materials. Frances and Denise met with Ms. Minatodani and came to an informal agreement about how to handle the materials and the best way to incorporate them into the UH system. There is still much work ahead on the part of the committee – very likely the materials will have to be redacted, due to addresses, phone numbers, and email addresses contained in the various materials. The materials will be scanned and digitized (HAFCE's responsibility) and then the digitized files will be turned over to UH Manoa Library for final keeping. The files will be available to the public – i.e. researchers, historians, general public – thus the need for redacting. The committee anticipates at least another year, if not longer, to complete all of this.



Jeanette Pang's two friends, Sharon and Roland. Children as well as adults enjoyed making the flowers out of the plastic disposable spoons, using remnant

yard. Participants were very surprised at the outcome of their spoon/yarn weaving. Members suggested various ways in which they could use their flowers: making a flower arrangement, bracelets, luggage tags, lei using purchased calyx to form the base of the flowers. The other craft was the bottle cap spinner which participants decorated their caps and inserted the string to allow the bottle cap to spin. Adults found it harder to get the bottle cap to spin than the children. Lots of fun spinning.









RHODA YOSHINO'S PASTA SALAD











Have you ever had pasta salad? Sure, you say. But have you had pasta salad with miso? You're in for a treat! Rhoda demonstrated this recipe. In large mixing bowl, place cooked pasta, carrots, broccoli, cucumbers, sesame seeds and edamame and toss to mix. In a separate jar, place miso, grated ginger, lime juice, low sodium soy sauce, oil, rice vinegar, sesame il, sesame seeds and sugar. (Miso and grated ginger should be blended well before adding other ingredients.) Once in jar, shake to combine all ingredients. When mixture is combined well, pour over pasta mixture, toss well and its done. Enjoy! Recipe attached to newsletter.

PAT KUBO/DAVID HAITSUKA NISHIME



Not only did we enjoy eating Rhoda's pasta salad, Pat brought nishime. What is Nishime you ask? It's a Japanese delicacy which includes mushrooms, nishime konbu, araimo, carrots, hasu, bamboo shoots, konyaku, daikon, aburage and chicken. The dried mushrooms and konbu are soaked in water until soft. Cut mushrooms, in triangular shapes (Pat was taught to cut it in this shape), tie knots in konbu and separate sections. Parboil araimo and peel. Cut in triangular shapes or halves. Cut vegetables (triangular shapes) and chicken

in bite size pieces.

Heat oil and fry chicken pieces, add shoyu, sugar, dashi, chicken bouillon paste and water. Then add mushrooms and abruage and simmer. Add other ingredients slowly in this order so that they don't overcook - konbu, bamboo shoots, carrots, hasu, daikon, konyaku and araimo. Simmer until all are soft and its ready to eat!

Pat indicated that she doesn't have a recipe with actual portion measurements, so she's referring David's recipe. If you don't want to purchase all of these ingredients separately, you can purchase prepackaged Wel-Pac Mixed vegetables in the frozen section of ingredients at Don Quijote and other ingredients.

KUMIHIMO (Japanese Braiding)



Want an easy and inexpensive craft to do? This craft is easy for young children as well as adults. As shown in the picture, all you need is a cardboard, string (can be solid or multicolor) to create this style of braiding. Pat demonstrated the Japanese braiding referred to as Kumihimo. Using a circular cardboard with eight slits, strings were placed in seven of them. With a knot on the underside of the cardboard, (right-handed) count



three strings to the left (left-handed) count three strings to the right, place that string into the blank slit. Continue this sequence

until your desired length is reached. Remove string and tie a knot. Isn't this craft just cute and easy? You don't need to worry about where you left off. Just look for the open slit. Easy as that. Give it a try at a get together, working with children and adults. Hardly any expense as you can use items you have at home and improvise.

KOREAN CHICKEN by David Haitsuka

September brought more ono goodies from members who are presenting our monthly program. David decided to demonstrate how to make his famous Korean Chicken. Very simple recipe for 5# of Chicken Wings.

7 Tbsp Flour 7 Tbsp Sugar 2½ tsp Salt 13 Tbsp Cornstarch 2 Tbsp Sesame Seeds 2 Tbsp Shoyu* 3 Large Eggs Beaten 3 Stalks Green Onions (chopped) 3 Cloves Garlic finely chopped

Shoyu makes the color darker or lighter by adding more or less)

Combine all ingredients together in a large baggie or bowl until well blended.

Chicken should be washed and dried with paper towel before placing into batter mixture, turning over baggie/spoon if in a bowl. It's better to let mixture stand for a day or two before cooking.

Chicken is placed in oil (325° - 350°) until cooked and is nice and brown. Place on paper towel to drain excess oil. Enjoy Everyone! It's so yummy. Let us know what you think of this recipe.























In the photos above, the layout of all the ingredients for the Korean Chicken. The eggs were scrambled a bit before adding the shoyu mixture. Pour this mixture into the baggie containing dried chicken, then adding the flour, sugar, cornstarch, salt, sesame seeds, green onions, garlic. Close baggie and mix ingredients together until all ingredients have been blended. Store in refrigerator for a couple of days for mixture to soak into chicken. When ready to cook, take out, mix baggie to incorporate ingredients. Fry in oil. Place on paper towel to absorb oil and its ready to enjoy. Leftovers can be refrigerated for another meal. Microwave 30 seconds to take chill off of chicken, place in toaster oven on toast setting to brown crust again. Enjoy.
